Background:

To enhance public safety, accessibility, and infrastructure throughout New Rochelle, the Department of Development proposes reallocating unused Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds from prior program years. This reallocation would provide additional funding for key projects, including sidewalk and ADA improvements, accessibility enhancements at Lincoln Park, and covering a funding shortfall for the redesign of the Transit Center.

The proposed reallocation will make \$535,408.23 available for sidewalk and ADA improvements, supplementing the \$150,000 already allocated in the 2025 budget. Additionally, \$114,759.63 will be redirected for ADA improvements at Lincoln Park, and another \$101,301.58 will address a funding shortfall in the Transit Center budget line to cover previously authorized contract costs.

Issue:

To move forward with these reallocated funds, the City must amend its CDBG Annual Action Plans and budgets for program years 2018-2024. Federal regulations require a Substantial Amendment to these plans, which necessitates the following:

- Amendments to the 2018-2024 CDBG Annual Action Plans.
- Amendments to the 2018-2024 CDBG Budgets.
- A Public Hearing scheduled for April 8, 2025.
- A 30-day Public Comment Period from March 12, 2025, to April 10, 2025.

No. 1, to amend Section 127A, Liability of city in certain actions, of Article XII, General Financial Provisions, of the New Rochelle City Charter in relation to the requirement for prior written notice of an alleged defect. (Intro. 3/18/25; Public Hearing 4/8/25)

The City has a “prior written notice” statute, codified in Article XII, Section 127A, of the City Charter, which provides that civil claims for injuries sustained as a result of certain defects allegedly created by the City can only be brought against the City if the Commissioner of Public Works actually received notice of the particular defect that allegedly caused the injury *in writing* prior to the occurrence of the injury. Prior written notice statutes ensure that municipalities will not be held responsible for injuries caused by defects about which they are not aware, and are allowed in recognition of the fact that municipalities cannot be cognizant of every crack or defect within their borders.

However, in a recent New York Court of Appeals decision, *Calabrese v. City of Albany*, the Court interpreted a prior written notice statute similar to the City of New Rochelle’s and greatly expanded the definition of prior written notice to include, effectively, any electronic communication sent to a statutory designee.

This proposed local law will return, to the City’s prior written notice statute, the requirement that notice be given actually in writing, on paper, to the statutory designee, in keeping with the intent of the statute as it was originally enacted. The amendment also allows the City to change the statutory designee for all prior written notices from the Commissioner of Public Works to the City Clerk, ensuring centralized record-keeping.

Section 1. Section 127A, Liability of city in certain actions, of Article XII, General Financial Provisions of the New Rochelle City Charter, is hereby amended to read as follows:

No civil action shall be maintained against the city for damages or injuries to person or property sustained in consequence of any street, highway, [trees,] bridge, culvert, [sanitary sewer or storm drains,] sidewalk or crosswalk [any other public place] being defective, out of repair, unsafe, dangerous or obstructed, or in consequence of the existence of snow or ice thereon, unless written notice thereof, specifying the particular place, had actually been given to the City Clerk [Commissioner of Public Works] prior to the happening of the event causing such damage or injury to person or property, and there was a failure or neglect by the city to repair or remove the defect, danger or obstruction or to cause the snow or ice to be removed or the specified place to be made reasonably safe within a reasonable time after the receipt of notice relating to it. Such written notice must describe, in reasonable detail, the location and nature of the referenced condition(s), shall be manually subscribed, and shall be delivered to the City Clerk by hand, first class, or certified mail.

Notice of a defect submitted via email, the city's website, any service, website, or application the city uses to allow the public to submit reports or service requests to the city, comments on a social media page maintained by the city, or any other electronic means does not satisfy the process and procedure for submitting written notices of defect required by this section.

Section 2. This local law shall take effect upon final passage, public hearing, and filing with the Secretary of State.

Situation:

The City has the ability to align with New York State's Executive Order 22 by revising its procurement policy to incorporate purchasing decisions that prioritize environmentally sustainable products and services. This addendum would demonstrate the City's commitment to supporting the State's environmental goals while maintaining compliancy with all other statutory regulations.

Recommendation:

Adding a new sub-section (D) to the City's Purchasing Policy under Chapter 62, Section 4, the City can incorporate sustainability into the City's operations under the approved specifications of the GreenNY Council. This allows for procurement specification to the maximum extent practical and where cost is reasonably competitive, up to a maximum of 15% compared to the lowest price, as defined in General Municipal Law § 104-a.

LEGISLATION

ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 62, PROCUREMENT POLICY, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF NEW ROCHELLE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City of New Rochelle:

Section 1. Chapter 62, Procurement Policy, of the Code of the City of New Rochelle, is hereby amended as follows:

Chapter 62. Procurement Policy

§ 62-4 Exceptions.

Pursuant to General Municipal Law § 104-b2f, the procurement policy may anticipate circumstances when or types of procurements for which, in the sole discretion of the governing body, the solicitation of alternative proposals or quotations will not be in the best interest of the municipality. The determination that such circumstances exist shall, in each case, only be made by either the City Manager or by resolution of the City Council of the City of New Rochelle. In the following circumstances it may not be in the best interests of the City of New Rochelle to solicit quotations. Written documentation of such determination and approval must be maintained for each procurement:

- . Emergency purchases pursuant to § 103, Subdivision 4, of the General Municipal Law. Due to the nature of this exception, these goods or services must be purchased immediately, and a delay in order to seek alternate proposals may threaten the life, health, safety or welfare of the residents. This subsection does not preclude alternate proposals if time permits. Emergency procurements require approval of the City Manager or their designee through either the Department Head or City Manager or their designee, when circumstances allow.
- . Purchases of surplus and secondhand goods from any source. If alternate proposals are required, the City is precluded from purchasing surplus and secondhand goods at auctions or through specific advertised sources where the best prices are usually obtained. It is also difficult to try to compare prices of used goods, and a lower price may indicate an older product. Therefore, as set forth in this § 62-6, such purchases may be authorized.
- . Sole Source procurement may be entered into without a competitive process, based on written documentation that only one known source exists or that there are no other reasonable alternative sources that can fulfill the requirements and

where competition is not feasible.

- . To promote environmental sustainability, the City of New Rochelle may prioritize goods and services, whether by competitive bid or other type of procurement, that is the subject of a GreenNY procurement specification that has received final approval of the NYS GreenNY Council pursuant to Executive Order No. 22, the purchasing officer shall follow the GreenNY procurement specification to the maximum extent practical and where cost is reasonably competitive, up to a maximum of 15% compared to the lowest price, as defined in General Municipal Law § 104-a.

SITUATION:

Small Claims Assessment Review (SCAR) applications are residents opportunity to grieve their assessed value and if successful, reduce their tax obligation.

The current assessment calendar has SCAR applications and decisions arriving after the city budgeting process. Tax rates are apportioned according to assessed value to fulfill the entire tax levy. Because these arrive after tax rates are set in our budget, refunds are required and the levy is shortened.

PROPOSAL:

We are proposing that the New Rochelle City Charter be amended, subject to a public hearing, to alter the assessment calendar in order to facilitate smooth, accurate tax apportionment for the budgeting process and a reduction in tax refunds.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is the recommendation of the staff that the assessment calendar be changed, subject to a public hearing, consistent with the calendar attached.

SUBJECT: PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CODE OF THE CITY OF NEW ROCHELLE RE: ADDITION OF CARBON MONOXIDE AND SMOKE DETECTORS IN LIVE ABOARD VESSELS - Ordinance amending Section 168-21, Live-Aboard Vessels, of Chapter 168, Harbor Management, of the Code of the City of New Rochelle.

BACKGROUND

The City of New Rochelle supports a wide range of public and private water-related uses, including, among other things, recreational and commercial boating, anchorage and mooring, marinas, yacht clubs and charter vessels. A harbor management plan is in place to manage the efficient use of the harbor; to ensure the safety of commercial and recreational navigation in the waters or waterways of the City of New Rochelle. The operation and mooring of vessels in New Rochelle and the safe and efficient use of space within the harbor are matters affecting the public interest and are subject to regulatory controls in Chapter 168, Harbor Management, of the Code of the City of New Rochelle.

The City of New Rochelle currently has seven (7) privately-owned marinas and one (1) municipally-owned marina within its harbor management area.

ISSUE

City staff has recently reviewed Chapter 168, Harbor Management, of the Code of the City of New Rochelle. As a result of this review, staff is suggesting the following two revisions to Chapter 168.

1. **Add Requirement for Carbon and Smoke Detection Systems on Live-Aboard Vessels:** National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) Code 302, Fire Protection Standard for Pleasure and Commercial Motor Craft, recommends that carbon monoxide and smoke detection systems be installed on all boats with an enclosed accommodation compartment, in each of those compartments, including in every sleeping area that is not open to a weather deck.
2. **Add Requirement that a vessel occupied as living quarters shall not be shrink-**

wrapped or covered in any way: Section 168-21, Live-Aboard Vessels, of the City Code, stating that a vessel may be occupied as living quarters provided that the vessel "is capable of leaving its slip or mooring and proceeding to the mid- (Long Island) Sound ship channel unassisted, at any time".

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that City Council adopt the attached changes to Section 168-21, Live-Aboard Vessels, of Chapter 168, Harbor Management, of the Code of the City of New Rochelle.

LEGISLATION

ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 168-21, LIVE-ABROAD VESSELS, OF CHAPTER 168, HARBOR MANAGEMENT, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF NEW ROCHELLE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City of New Rochelle:

Section 1. Section 168-21, Live-abroad vessels, of Chapter 168, Harbor Management, of the New Rochelle City Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 168-21. Live-aboard vessels.

- A. Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall live aboard any vessel or any floating or fixed structure over the water, nor shall any person or Marina owner or operator permit any vessel to be used as living quarters when moored or docked within the waters of the City of New Rochelle.
- B. During the period April 1 to November 30, a vessel may be occupied as living quarters, provided that:
 - 1) The vessel is of a type typically used for recreational boating and is suitable for general navigation on Long Island Sound under its own propulsion and is capable of leaving its slip or mooring and proceeding to the mid-Sound ship channel unassisted, at any time.
 - 2) The vessel shall be moored or docked in a marina that has access to the Sound for that vessel at all normal tidal levels the year round, excluding periods of hazardous conditions.
 - 3) The vessel is equipped with a marine toilet in operating condition, approved by the United States Coast Guard.
 - 4) All vessels with enclosed accommodation compartments are equipped with a working carbon monoxide and smoke detection system in each enclosed compartment including in every sleeping area that is not open to a weather deck.
 - 5) The vessel shall not be shrink-wrapped or covered in any way.
- C. During the period from December 1 to March 31, a vessel may be occupied as living quarters, provided that:
 - 1) The vessel is of a type typically used for recreational boating and is suitable for general navigation on Long Island Sound under its own propulsion and is capable

of leaving its slip or mooring and proceeding to the mid-Sound ship channel unassisted, at any time.

- 2) The vessel shall be moored or docked in a marina that has access to Long Island Sound for that boat at all normal tidal levels the year round, excluding periods of hazardous boating conditions.
- 3) The vessel is equipped with a marine sanitation device in operating condition, approved by the United States Coast Guard.
- 4) Such occupancy does not cause the number of vessels occupied as living quarters in any marina to exceed the percentage specified in Subsection F below.
- 5) A permit for such occupancy is issued for such vessel by the Harbormaster.
- 6) All vessels with enclosed accommodation compartments are equipped with a working carbon monoxide and smoke detection system in each enclosed compartment including in every sleeping area that is not open to a weather deck.
- 7) The vessel shall not be shrink-wrapped or covered in any way.

Background:

On September 16, 2015, the Council of the City of New Rochelle adopted Ordinance No. 176-2015 which amended the Code of the City of New Rochelle to add Chapter 131, entitled “Community Choice Aggregation (Energy) Program. The aforementioned Ordinance enabled the City of New Rochelle to participate in a Community Choice Aggregation (Energy) Program.

The City of New Rochelle first joined the Westchester Power program in April of 2016 when the initial Electric Service Agreement (ESA) commenced. The City has remained in the Westchester Power program for four (4) additional Electric Service Agreements including the current agreement which will expire on November 30, 2025.

As of 2025, the Westchester Power program serves 26 municipalities across Westchester County providing renewable energy to approximately 140,000 households and small businesses.

Issue:

With the expiration of the current contract occurring on November 30, 2025, the City Council now has the option of participating in the next Electric Service Agreement.

Participation in this program requires the City to execute an Electric Service Agreement (ESA).

Prior to signing the ESA, Sustainable Westchester asks participating municipalities to:

-) Enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to confirm their commitment; and,
-) Select New Rochelle’s default electricity supply, either 50% renewable or 100% renewable.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that City Council adopt a resolution selecting New Rochelle's default electricity supply at either 50% renewable or 100% renewable, and authorizing the City Manager to execute any and all documents relative to Sustainable Westchester's Community Choice Aggregation program Westchester Power including the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) and Electric Service Agreement (ESA).

LEGISLATION

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING RELATED TO THE COMMUNITY CHOICE AGGREGATION PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the City of New Rochelle is a member of Sustainable Westchester and a participant in the Community Choice Aggregation Program (“CCA”); and

WHEREAS, the current Electric Service Agreement (ESA) for the Sustainable Westchester CCA program terminates on November 30, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the City of New Rochelle desires to continue to engage the services of Sustainable Westchester, Inc. as the Program Manager for CCA and administration of the program; and

WHEREAS, in connection with the CCA, Sustainable Westchester has provided the City of New Rochelle with information regarding the plan to secure a new ESA (2025 ESA); and

WHEREAS, a new Memorandum of Understanding (2025 MOU) with Sustainable Westchester will allow for the bid for electricity supply to be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the 2025 MOU is to: a) establish the City of New Rochelle’s participation in the CCA program to be managed by Sustainable Westchester, Inc. under the 2025 Electric Service Agreement (2025 ESA); b) to affirm that the City of New Rochelle and Sustainable Westchester, Inc. agree to adhere to the terms and conditions of the 2025 ESA in the event the 2025 ESA is executed; and c) to affirm that the City of New Rochelle and Sustainable Westchester, Inc. agree to execute the 2025 ESA subject to the conditions of review and approval outlined in the MOU; and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of New Rochelle does hereby authorize the City Manager to execute the 2025 MOU with Sustainable Westchester, Inc., selecting the [50% / 100%] Renewable Clean Power Product as the default, and the associated 2025 ESA subject to receiving a Compliant Offer, as defined in the MOU, as required to continue participating in the CCA program.
